The Woodpecker Ranch is the result of a remodeling that aims to remain unchanged over time. Feldman Architecture was in charge of adapting an almost new construction to the demands of its customers.

LOCATED SOUTH OF SAN FRANCISCO, WOODPECKER RANCH IS THE MODERN VERSION OF A COUNTRY HOUSE.

Feldman Architecture redefined the entrance space to the house and added a level to the exterior facade to make it more attractive and aesthetic. In collaboration with Arterra Landscape Architects, the teams located a large

water source at the entrance and used retaining walls to make it a more welcoming area, the desire of the new owners.

The **design of the** entrance **stairway** was simplified to give visual transparency, so that its presence is felt without being very visible.

In the common area the design of the kitchen is a large open space, imposing, created to share moments.
